


English and Maths Home Learning Week beginning 8.6.20





Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Watch a Numberblocks clip each day at: BBC or CBeebies
- Play the Numberblocks pattern spotting game using the following link https://www.bbc.co.uk/cbeebies/puzzles/numberblocks-easy-patterns-quiz
- Explore the nrich website and complete some of the activities. https://nrich.maths.org/13371
- Play this counting game.https://www.sheppardsoftware.com/presch ool/animals/farm/animalfarmgame.htm
 Count how many of each animal you can see.
- Practise counting backwards from 20. This can be done through playing hide and seek, singing number songs, chanting, board games etc
- Use the 'Tens Frames' or 'Five Frames' on this game and practise recognising amounts.

 This can also be done by reading a dice when playing board games, playing with cards, identifying how many food items on the plate etc.

Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Continue to read a variety of books at home.
 You can read your favourites over and over again. What patterns in the story can you hear?
- With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for certain letters.
 Start with their initial letter in their name.
 They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers.

Weekly Phonics Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Sing Nursery Rhymes and songs together. Add in actions and change the words. Can children think of different rhyming words to add in? Repeat old favourites and learn new rhymes. You can find an A-Z of Nursery Rhymes here: https://allnurseryrhymes.com/
- Daily phonics Continue to practise the initial sounds of objects around you, and blend words. This can be oral blending (e.g. spoken out loud c-at) or written if appropriate. Interactive games found on link below. https://www.phonicsplay.co.uk/
- Play this animal sound match game. https://www.phonicsbloom.com/uk/game/match-sounds?phase=1
- Sing the song, 'Old McDonald Had a Farm'. Instead
 of saying the name of the animal, make the sound.
 Can your child figure out which animal it is?
 What sound/letter does that animal start with?

Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Draw an animal of your choice. Label the parts of the animal. Can you create a fact file e.g. where does it live? What does it eat?
- Practise name writing. Can you write your first name? Surname? Praise all the marks your child makes.
- Draw a picture of your favourite animal and label it with the initial sound of its name. If you can write other sounds/letters you can hear when you say the animals name. Eg. For 'pig' your child may hear the 'p' and the last sound 'g'. Encourage them to write a 'p' and a 'g'. Model writing if this is more suitable for where your child is with their mark making.
- Draw a farm or a map of a farm like in the story 'What the Ladybird heard'.
